Queensway improvements start soon



Following an update to the Town Deal Board meeting on Thursday 18 September, the Queensway Public Realm Project is expected to begin at the end of Autumn.

You'll soon see MKCC contractors clad in Hi-Viz jackets, boots and hard hats preparing to start the work which will help transform Queensway.

The Highways team at the city council has planned the work in phases, each phase taking approximately one month to complete. Ringway (the contractor carrying out the works on behalf of the city council) may adapt work patterns due to factors such as resourcing or poor weather. The project is due to finish in spring 2026.

The Town Deal team, Highways team, and Ringway will be working with shop owners and businesses in and around Queensway to ensure it's business as usual, especially around Christmas time. There will be Ringway Managers onsite each day who will have detailed daily work plans.

The changes that will help to improve and transform Queensway include

- Making Queensway a one-way street from Albert Street to Princess Way to balance the needs and safety of the different types of travel and transport.
- Building a two-way cycle path along Queensway, Albert Street to Princess Way.
- Constructing raised table crossings on Queensway and all side streets to create continuous pavements making the streets safer for pedestrians, disabled people, and people who use mobility aids.
- Adding playful street furniture to encourage dwell time.
- Creating open areas with adaptable furniture and to support markets, street performances and community gatherings.
- Installing more, and better, signage to carparks and places of interest.
- Laying new pathing designs that reflect local heritage.
- Improving the street lighting.
- Installing planters/bollards/structures to prevent pavement parking.
- Increasing the number of parking spaces on Queensway, including disabled parking spaces.
- Creating space for outdoor seating in front of cafes and restaurants.
- Relocating the bandstand on Stanier Square to make more space for events and market traders.
- Upgrading water and electricity supplies for events and market traders.
- Planting new trees, pollinator-friendly species and a mix of ground level beds and raised planters to enrich biodiversity.

More Updates: Saxon Street



As part of the Town Deal, the bus station will be improved.

The plans for the Transport Hub - Saxon Street, Princes Way, and Sherwood Drive - have been approved by Milton Keynes city council, Bletchley Town Deal Board and Network Rail.

We've added another phase to the project, so it now comprises four phases

Phase 1 Princes Way Detailed design has been completed on this phase, and we're costing the work. We aim to begin this phase early 2026.

Phase 2 Sherwood Drive roundabout Detailed design has begun.

Phase 3 Saxon Street Site investigations are underway which will inform the designs.

Phase 4 Bus Station Site investigations are underway which will inform the designs.

The Town Deal team continues to meet with Network Rail and East West Rail to discuss the plans and programme of work for the western entrance, the aspiration for an eastern entrance, and the reconstruction of the overbridge on Saxon Street north of Bletchley Railway Station.



Aylesbury Street



Traffic calming measures have been installed on Aylesbury Street.

The public realm improvement project for Aylesbury Street is nearing completion. On Monday 6 October, contractors will be onsite to instal the imprint design on top of the raised table crossing at the side street crossings - Eden Court, Denmark Street, George Street and Church Street.

All the roads will be open apart from the side street they are working on. It will take approximately one week, starting at Eden Court, and progressing up to (and including) Church Street.

Redways



You can cycle or walk on a new section of the Redway from the Blue Lagoon (above) to the town centre.

The Town Deal Redways project is nearing completion. With only the landscaping to Section 2 and the installation of six signs to do, we hope you're enjoying, by foot or bicycle, the new Redways that link the town centre from the Lakes Estate, Newton Leys or the Blue Lagoon.

The Brunel Centre

A Prior Approval application to demolish the Brunel Centre was submitted to the city council Planning Team on Monday 1 September. Printed notices have been put up around the building to inform residents and visitors. This notification is part of the planning process and does not mean that demolition is about to happen, but that the city council expects to complete the demolition in 2026.

The city council is working on a master plan for the site. This includes carrying out appraisals and viability studies for the development of the site.



Introducing Hello Bletchley, a public art project to create a sculpture that will be a focal point in the reinvigorated Queensway. The artwork, by artist Nick Ryan, will be a 'living' tribute to Alan Turing shaped by the community.

Underpinning this ambitious and innovative project is the method of creating the sculpture: Residents are key to the development of the artwork. They'll be invited to workshops where they can share thoughts and feelings about life in Bletchley with a futuristic conversation machine called A1. Then, by using a technical tool inspired by Turing's work, their words will be used to form the structure of the sculpture.

The free workshops will start in late October. Residents will be able to pop along to a drop-in session; schools/students can have a more formal session; and community groups can enjoy a group session.

The workshops include meeting the project team and A1, as well as taking part in hands-on sculpture-making.

- Drop-in sessions (2-10 min) for events and festivals
- Formal workshops (1.5-2 hours) for schools and groups
- Group sessions (1-3 hours) for community centres

scanned photos they brought with them to add to the archive.




